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Planning board welcomes a new member, reorganizes

SOUTH HADLEY - The Planning Board met this week to welcome a new member to the board, organize positions, and open a listening session for discussion of amendments to the Flexible Development Bylaw.

The April 22 meeting was led by Chair Diane Mulvaney, and she was joined by Vice Chair Nate Therien, Clerk Joanna Brown, members Brad Hutchison, and Michael Davis.

Also in attendance were Director of Planning and Conservation Anne Capra, Colleen Canning from the Conservation Department, and Rob Watchilla from the Zoning Board of Appeals.

New member and reorganization

"Rob Watchilla, we welcome you to the board," Mulvaney said.

She moved to call for a vote for the three main roles of Chair, Vice-Chair, and Clerk, and it was voted for members already in those positions to remain.

Capra brought up the need for the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission to have a representative from the board.

"I nominate myself to be an alternate for the PVPC Board," Rob Watchilla said.

Amendments bylaw

"Anne is going to give us a presentation on the Flexible Development Bylaw," Mulvaney

Capra shared her screen a presentation of proposed amendments to the Bylaw.

"The board wanted to bring forward where they were at with the Flexible Development Bylaw and working on amendments for it," Capra said. "We've been working on this for months now...it's been at least 10 months now."

Because the last updates were made in 1995, and laws have changes, the board has decided to begin working on updates.

"The Flexible Development Bylaw is a zoning tool that creates a subdivision with a portion of the parcel devoted to protected open space," Capra explained.

They have come up with three ideas to revise and amend parts of the Bylaw in order to remove confusion, uniformity on common open space requirements, and design standards for driveway bylaws.

"Therefore, through this Flexible Development Bylaw, we're looking to one, amend our existing bylaw to clean it up in the ways I described...we would clean up the Multifamily and Multiple Dwellings Amendment, and create Open Driveway and Space Bylaws," Capra said.

She then opened the floor to the board and the members of

A look back at South **Hadley High**

SOUTH HADLEY—Before South Hadley High School was built on Newton Street, South Hadley and Granby residents attended high school in South Hadley Town Hall. A new website has interviews with South Hadley and Granby residents who attended high school in the town hall between 1936 and 1958.

A class of Anthropology students at Mount Holyoke College conducted interviews with thirty-eight South Hadley and Granby residents. A new class of students recently created a website that has the interviews, photos from the time, and interesting comments about what it was like to attend high school in the 1940's and 1950's.

The project started in 2007 when the South Hadley Historical Society worked on an oral history project with Joshua Roth, Professor of Anthropology at Mount Holyoke. The Town of South Hadley provided useful information and allowed for the use of Town Hall for the interviews. The new website is at

Live music will be provided by saxophonist Michael Wilbur. Light refreshments will be served. The show will also be live-streamed on South Hadley's Community TV Station Channel 15.

PVPA offers Sustainable Fashion as a Visual Arts Class to students in Grades 7 & 8. The course, taught by Petula Bloomfield, studies the new trends in sustainable fashion practices with an emphasis on the up-cycling of waste fabrics and pre-existing clothing. Students study fashion from

around the world and across history and explore the use and transformation of found materials into wearable art forms using the body as armature. Students are introduced to different fabrics and new fabric technology such as 3D printers. Basic sewing skills are learned, in addition to draping and combining garments.

Ms Bloomfield's collaboration with the South Hadley Senior Center has included previously offering a sustainable fashion class for seniors, and several local residents will be sharing work in the show.

Volunteer models will select from racks of clothing and accessories to walk down the runway. Students will be modeling their own pieces and have invited friends from PVPA to model for them. Fashion items they have made to share include bags, upcycled clothes and also tie dye shirts with additions of patches.

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
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Man pleads not guilty

SOUTH HADLEY— South Hadley man pleaded not guilty to charges stemming from thefts from businesses in Northampton and Deerfield. The indictments allege that Steven Skea, 64, broke into two businesses, making off with items valued over \$100,000 on Oct. 28, 2023 and Aug. 20, 2023. Skea faces two counts of breaking and entering in the nighttime, two counts of larceny in a building and unlawful possession of a firearm without a permit. At the request of Northwestern Assistant District Attorney Joseph Webber, Hampshire Superior Court Judge Karen Goodwin set the next court hearing date for May 16 for a possible change of plea. Goodwin ordered Skea held without bail until that hearing. Skea is being represented by defense attorney Alfred Chamberland of Easthampton

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Do it now, while the forsythia is blooming

It's funny how nature is sometimes used as a cue to do this or do that.

The term is phenology. When I was first learning about perennials all those years ago at UMass, I remember my instructor say-

> ing it was safe to remove winter protection "when the forsythia is bloom-

It is also safe to prune roses and butterfly bush "when the forsythia is blooming." And it's time to sow your peas and plant grass seed, too.

Kinda cool, isn't it, that nature can dictate when it is safe or indeed the best time to accomplish things in the garden?

The forsythia is blooming nicely in my front yard, and I did head out over the weekend to tackle some of the above. My pink "Fairy" rose bush was in dire need of clean up.

There was a wee bit of winter kill that I trimmed back to the next nice node. Shockingly there were still some spent flower clusters left from last year; those were removed as well.

Long arching branches were reigned in it's not good for roses to be all over the ground where they are more susceptible to fungal issues. Likewise, canes that were crossing each other or branching out at weird angles were remedied too.

I applied a sprinkling of granular organic fertilizer at the base of the plant to support all of the beautiful blooms I'm expecting to have.

My 2-year-old Butterfly Bush (Buddleia) barely suffered any winter kill at all in contrast to last year when it died back all the way to the ground! I'm excited because that means it has a couple of feet head start and earlier blooms to boot!

I had to remove only a couple of inches of dead tips. I applied a balanced fertilizer here too in hopes of many beautiful purple flowers.

Other sections of my perennial beds met with different jobs to be done. Gayfeather (Liatris spicata) always looks unkept until new growth ensues.

I try to cut the old stems down a bit further and rake my hands through the dead, grasslike foliage, clipping away what doesn't come free easily. If you look within the plant you'll notice whitish tips of new growth. It won't be long!

I find a lot of satisfaction from cultivating the perennial garden, but it's almost too early to do that. Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberosa) is still weeks away from popping up.

If I haphazardly scratch around in the garden it could be at the plant's expense or at the expense of any self-sown seedlings that germinated. Purple Coneflower (Echinacea purpurea) is always a good self-sower, but it's up to you to decide if these tiny plants are worthy of keeping or weeding out.

Same goes for Ballon Flower (Platycodon). Lavender (Lavandula) is sometimes slow to wake up too, but this year the plants already look "alive." Many times, you have to search within the plant for signs of fresh silver-green growth, then cut back to that point.

This year, like we saw with the Butterly Bush, there seems to be very little winter kill. I'm going to leave be for now and not prune anything yet.

I planted Hollyhocks (Alcea rosea) near my lamp post last spring and they grew great all summer. I thought it would be neat to have 6-7foot spires of papery pastel blooms reaching

Capital improvements need to be budgeted for

Dear Editor,

District 2 Water Department instituted a \$20 additional charge to our every two month bill last year to help build up the Water System Fund for a total of \$120. The Districts big users pay \$660 per 100 gallons while residents pay \$540 towards these big capital items. Like our sewer bills the managers hadn't budgeted for capital improvements as they wanted to keep our rates "stable". This coming year Wright & Burnett Ave, where some of the oldest pipes in the District exist, will get replaced with Stanton Ave to follow and than we'll need a million plus dollars to

work on College St. By then the water bond should be paid off and we can do a new one. All of this is just to say, Where does it stop? While I understand water mains need to get replaced, the Town's sewer system, and our roads must be addressed along with a totally new trash pick-up service, those on a fixed income particularly are being squeezed out of Town. Come to the District 2 annual meeting on Monday, May 6, at 7 p.m. to listen and respond. We all need to become more knowledgable.

Older husband and working wife seek guidance

Dear Rusty:

I am 74 years old, retired and receiving Social Security.

My wife will be 65 in January of 2025. Our hope was to start paying off some credit card expense by her receiving SS when she turns 65, however it appears there would be a substantial reduction to her benefits. Her work income is \$37,500 a year and she wasn't planning on retiring from work at age 65. Because I am 11 years older, we felt it makes sense to use her Social Security as a means to lower our debt. We have \$27,000 in credit card debt and I don't really want to use my 401(k) funds due to taxes. We pretty much live on my Social Security and pen-

Dear Seeking:

Your wife's Full Retirement Age for Social Security purposes is age 67. Because she will not yet have reached her FRA in January 2025, when she is 65, if she claims SS to start at that time, not only will her monthly amount be reduced, but she will be subject to Social Security's annual earnings test.

The earnings test sets a limit for how much can be earned by beneficiaries, who claim SS before FRA.

The earnings limit for 2024 is \$22,320. The limit for next year is not yet published (it's based on changes to the national wage index), but will be a bit higher likely about

Thus, I can't provide the exact impact, but if your wife's 2025 earnings exceed next year's limit, Social Security will take back \$1 in benefits for every \$2 over the limit (half of the amount over the limit). So, if your wife earns \$37,500 per year, that will likely be about \$14,000 over the limit and Social Security will take back half of that \$7,000.

They "take back" by withholding future benefits or you can repay them in a lump sum. So, you will have a choice repay Social Security from your other assets, or they will withhold your wife's SS benefits for the number of months needed to offset her penalty for exceeding the earnings limit.

The number of months they will withhold depends on how much is owed and what your wife's monthly SS benefit is. For example, if your wife's age-65 SS benefit is about average (\$1,900) and her penalty for exceeding the limit is \$7,000, Social Security would withhold your wife's benefit for four months to recover the penalty, but she would receive her full benefit for the remaining eight months of the year.

Unless your wife tells them in advance that she will exceed the limit, Social Security will find out the following year after you file your income taxes. But, in any case, your wife cannot avoid the annual earnings test for working before reaching her Full Retirement Age.

The earnings test goes away when your wife reaches her FRA of 67. Until that time, if she continues working she will have a choice to have her benefits withheld for a portion of the year or simply repay Social Security in a lump sum in which case her benefits would continue uninterrupted.

Granby man pleads guilty

BELCHERTOWN – A Granby man pleaded guilty in Eastern Hampshire District Court to two felony charges in connection with a motor vehicle crash that left a passenger in his vehicle dead on July 1, 2023.

Cory Menard, 30, admitted that on July 1, he and his longtime partner, Katelyn Gress, 28, of Granby, had both been at a bar in South Hadley and that after leaving the bar together shortly after 1 a.m., Menard lost control of his jeep on Pleasant Street in Granby. The jeep struck a mailbox and two telephone poles before rolling over several times, hitting another vehicle and injuring the driver.

Gress died as a result of injuries

sustained in the crash. Menard pleaded guilty before Eastern Hampshire District Court Presiding Judge Bruce Melikian to motor vehicle homicide while operating negligently and under the influence of alcohol; and reckless assault and battery with a dangerous weapon.

Judge Melikian sentenced Menard to serve 2 ½ years in the House of Correction followed by 2 years of probation with conditions that he refrain from alcohol use; comply with a remote alcohol monitoring device; and provide a DNA sample. Menard's conviction also carries a mandatory 15-year loss of his driver's license.

The commonwealth dismissed a manslaughter charge as part of the plea agreement. The sentence was jointly recommended by Northwestern Assistant District Attorney Andrew Covington and defense attorney Joseph Bernard of Springfield. "This was a tragic and preventable crash," said Covington. Covington noted that the family of Katelyn Gress showed tremendous compassion in requesting leniency, mainly because Menard and Gress shared a young child together. Covington also thanked the Granby Police Department, the State Police Detective Unit attached to the Northwestern District Attorney's Office, and the State Police Collision Analysis and Reconstruction Section for their efforts in the investigation.

FYI, there is a silver lining in this, because if your wife has benefits withheld because she exceeds the earnings limit before her FRA, after she reaches her full retirement age Social Security will give her time credit for the months when benefits were withheld, which will result in her monthly Social Security payment amount increasing somewhat at her full retirement age. Thus, over time, your wife may recover the benefits which were withheld for exceeding the annual earnings limit. But to get 100% of the benefit she's earned from a lifetime of working and be exempt from Social Security's earnings limit, she would need to wait until she reaches her FRA to claim.

GRANBY - Avoid a fine and license dogs on time with the town clerk's office. Postcard reminders have been mailed out to dog owners who have not yet licensed their dogs.

March and April are the months to license (bylaws of the Town of Granby CH XIV). The cost is \$6 for spayed /neutered, senior dogs over 10 years, and puppies under 12 months. All other dogs the cost is \$15. To avoid a \$25 late charge fee dogs should be licensed by May 1.

Those who wish to may get a license by mail. Please include a copy of the rabies vaccination or call the clerk's office for verification, a self-addressed envelope with two stamps, a check made payable to the Town of Granby, and mail to Town Clerk, 215 B West State St. Granby, MA.

All residents who licensed their dogs through the Town Census should have received their dog tags. Anyone who did not receive their dog tag should call the clerk's office.

Confirmation notices

This year, 2024, is big election year. Residents should make sure they are current with their town census information. Confirmation notices have been mailed out to all those voters who did not answer the 2024 town census as required by MA General Laws Ch 51, Sec 4. Therefore, all voters who receive this postcard are now designated as "Inactive" on the Granby Voting List.

To activate their voting status, residents should please mail back this postcard, and if they did not receive an annual Town Census or would like to check on their voting status, they should call the town clerk's office for verification.

Voter registration

Anyone who is not a registered voter but would like to be should do so by Friday, May 3, which is the last day to register to vote to be eligible to participate in the following events: The annual Town Meeting on May 13 and the annual Town Election on May 20.

Last day voter registration will be held in the town clerk's office located in the Town Hall Annex, at 215 B West State St. on Friday, May 3, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Other ways to register to vote: register by stopping by the town clerk's office before the deadline, or pick up mail in voter registration forms at the Granby Post Office, or the Granby Public Library. 


